- 1. Duke Nursing partners to design effective care delivery models to support the growth and expansion of the health system.
- 2. Duke Nursing delivers and advances the highest quality care consistently across the enterprise.
- 3. Every patient and family will engage with Duke Nursing to achieve an optimal and consistent caring experience.
- 4. Duke Nursing serves as influential leaders in organizational design, governance and decision making.
- 5. Duke Nursing delivers organizational value through professional development and enhancing the nursing brand.
- 6. Duke Nursing leverages technology to enhance communication, care delivery and business processes.

Each objective includes a set of strategies and tactics, which I'll be sharing with you over the next few months. We're working to finalize a complete communication plan, with many events and activities to keep you informed and involved as the strategic plan begins to take shape.

Revised Mission, Vision and Professional Practice Model

As part of the work on the strategic planning process, we reviewed our nursing mission, vision and Professional Practice Model, as well as the components of a Magnet organization, to validate that the plan was properly aligned with all of these elements. After determining that some changes were necessary, changes to our Professional Practice Model were proposed to the Nurse Executive Committee, then the DUHS Clinical Practice Council, the Quality and Safety Council, the Professional Development Council, shared governance forums and nursing leadership. As a result, I'm pleased to announce that we have revised our Professional Practice Model to further guide Duke nurses to achieve higher standards to support the overall DUHS mission, vision and values.

New Nursing Mission

New approach at DRH eases ED wait times, smoothes transition to in-patient beds.

In the past, assigning a bed required several phone calls between the ED and a charge nurse for each of the 40 to 50 ED-to-bed admissions every 24 hours. The new system automatically alerts the charge nurse when a bed is assigned.

The charge nurse then electronically reviews the patient's record to make sure that the bed assignment is appropriate. If necessary, the bed assignment can be changed. Read more.

Cheryl Brewer Gives Keynote Speech at NCCU Graduation



Cheryl Brewer, PhD, MSN, RN, Associate Vice President of Nursing for Duke Private Diagnostic Clinic, gave the keynote speech for the nurse pinning ceremony and graduation at North Carolina Central University on May 5th. The title of Cheryl's address was: *Navigating The Nurse Journey: Care And Advocacy*, and she gave the graduates a great deal to think about as they begin their nursing careers!

Cheryl spoke about the complexities of healthcare today, the importance of ensuring patient satisfaction as well as using nursing skills and providing care in a value-based health care system, and how the graduates will be expected to "hit the ground running" in an intergenerational and diverse workforce, bringing to their careers the newly acquired humanities and academic exposure that nurses are expected to have now. She advised the graduates to be innovative and creative, and navigate their nursing journey through care and advocacy. She also emphasized the importance of self-

advocacy and resilience. Through a personal story, Cheryl gave an example involving her father, a double amputee patient with a myriad of health conditions and comorbidities, telling

the audience how nurses helped improve his quality of life during his last years by caring and advocating for him.

In closing, Cheryl said: "Class of 2017, you've come this far by faith – you have achieved, now succeed. Make it count! Lead the transformation in healthcare, and by all means continue to reach for the stars!" Cheryl received a standing ovation from the audience, and a plaque on behalf of the graduating class and faculty for delivering the keynote address.

Accreditation and Regulatory Affairs Corner

On May 22, 2017 the Joint Commission released NPSG revisions for Health Associated Infections. These revised requirements will go into effect on January 1, 2018 and include:

NPSG.07.03.01

EP 2 Educate staff and licensed independent practitioners about health care—associated infections, multidrug-resistant organisms and prevention strategies at hire and annually thereafter. Education occurs upon hire or granting of initial privileges and periodically thereafter as determined by the organization.

NPSG.07.04.01

Implement evidence-based practices to prevent central line–associated bloodstream infections. **Note**: *This requirement covers short- and long-term central venous catheters and peripherally inserted central catheter (PICC) lines.*

EP 1 Educate staff and licensed independent practitioners who are involved in managing central lines about central line–associated bloodstream infections and the importance of prevention. Education occurs upon hire or granting of initial privileges and periodically thereafter as determined by the organization.

EP 9 Use <u>maximum</u> sterile barrier precautions during central venous catheter insertion.

EP 11 Use an alcoholic chlorhexidine antiseptic for skin preparation during central venous catheter insertion. *unless contraindicated.
